From the Pastor's Desk:

"(Not so) Ordinary Time"

If you've come to Mass on Sunday or watched it on TV recently, you should have noticed that the priest is wearing green-colored vestments. It's a signal that we are in Ordinary Time. Now, that doesn't mean that nothing special is going to happen. It just means that we've started to count, or number, the Sundays outside the special liturgical seasons, beginning with the day after the feast of the Lord's baptism. It is the longest of seasons, usually covering about thirty-four weeks, and is the only one that's interrupted by other seasons, namely Lent and Eastertide. It's also chock full of special celebrations, solemnities, commemorations, memorials, feasts, and plenty of activities, both religious and non-religious.

There's the more common usage of ordinary time, though. That's the one with which we're more familiar, because it's the one that covers most of our lifetime. Again, it's not that nothing special is happening (there certainly are plenty of "Kodak moments"), but rather that occasions occur in more outstanding fashion in the context of our daily routines.

This past year was one in which the patterns and rhythms of our lives got very humdrum, even to the point where we might not have been certain what day of the week it was, they all seeming to blend together. Perhaps we got like Job in today's first reading, getting depressed over our situation, and tossing and turning in endless nights that opened onto swiftly passing days. It was like that for me at times during the lockdown. Were it not for my daily Masses and keeping up with praying the Breviary, I frequently could not tell one day from another. Yes, there was plenty of work to keep me occupied, but in a different way than usual.

Job's depression in today's first reading is contrasted sharply by St. Paul's enthusiasm for proclaiming the Gospel, the Good News of God's love for us in sending His Son as our Savior and Redeemer. In fact, Christ IS the Gospel personified, and St. Paul is excited about the prospect of sharing in His very life. It is something that he feels compelled to share with others. We also are called to shake off the Job and to put on the Paul, to make good use of the opportunities that come to us in the simple moments of life to proclaim our faith in Christ Jesus by living as He taught us: with self-sacrifice, trusting in God's presence and the grace He provides for us to accomplish our share in the work of sanctifying the world.

It is very tempting for us just to slip into the easy chair and veg in front of the tube, especially with socialization hampered or even prohibited because of the pandemic, but that is not the way of Christian discipleship. How easy it would have been for Jesus to tell Peter not to answer the door so that He could eat His supper in peace, but there were real needs to be addressed and healing to be done.

At the same time, it's not that we always must be "gotta-run-gotta-do". That's a great way to burn out. We see in today's Gospel passage that even Jesus found that He had to go someplace quiet from time to time in order to recharge Himself in prayer with the Father, the way that people today might go on a spiritual retreat or just spend some time in prayer in church, or at home, or in another conducive place. We also need to find a balance: to be active in serving the Lord and one another and to have our service strengthened and supported by our prayer life.

Ordinary Time will be interrupted in just a few weeks from now with the start of Lent, the period of preparation for the great solemnity of the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection. Don't waste the time you have been given by God, and don't enter into Lent "cold turkey". Begin now not only to plan your activities and prayer life but also to get them started, lest you find yourself in the doldrums like Job instead of the joy of Paul. No time that God gives us is ordinary. Yes, our very days are numbered, but every moment is an opportunity for us truly to live in Christ for the sake of the Gospel, that we, too, may have a share in it, in Him. He is our hope and the reason for our hope, and this hope does not disappoint.

ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

The <u>2020</u> Annual Catholic Appeal campaign has come to a close. Thanks to the **198 families who** have pledged \$77,638, we hit 97.0% of our goal of \$80,015.

While we didn't attain our goal this year, we exceeded the 2019 pledges by \$4,813. This is remarkable, given the difference in conditions between 2019 and 2020. God bless all of you who responded!
