#### From the Pastor's Desk:

## ~ Ignorance, Open Minds, and Discipleship ~

Easter is the great feast of feasts of the Church, so important that we celebrate it not just on one day or for one week but for a full fifty days. In fact, every Sunday is said to be a "little Easter", and, if we push the point, each celebration of Holy Mass can be called an Easter celebration, for we commemorate in every Eucharist the full Paschal Mystery of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection.

Today's Scriptures, building upon the post-Resurrection appearances of Christ and their aftermath, speak to us of actions: actions done in ignorance, actions done in rejection of the truth, and actions done with an enlightened mind.

First, St. Peter extends an olive branch of peace and reconciliation to his listeners in Jerusalem, recognizing that they had acted out of ignorance by their role in the death of Christ. Since He had overcome sin and death through His obedience to the Father's will, though, the means of universal and personal forgiveness were made possible. "All" the people had to do was repent of their sins and undergo a radical change of heart, turning from the corruption of old, sinful ways to the new life of grace. St. Peter's message applies equally to us today, for we, too, have the opportunity to reform our lives, to repent of our sins, and to receive absolution in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Not easy, but necessary.

We might ask, "Why do I have to go to confession, to reform, and to repent? I haven't done anything wrong." Enter St. John with today's reading from his first letter to one of his Christian communities in Asia Minor in which he speaks of Christ as THE expiation for the sins of every person in the world. Deny it as much as we want, we DO stand in need of that healing whenever we sin, i.e., whenever we act in a manner that is contrary to His teachings, which are intended to enable us to live a life of grace in union with Him and the Father through the Holy Spirit.

It's difficult for us to grasp that anyone, even God, could love us so much as to die for the wrongs that we have done and then to give us the gift of raising us to newness of life. It was difficult, even troubling, for Christ's first disciples, as well, as they received Him with fear, confusion, and trepidation. Perhaps that's why He stayed with them for another forty days after His Resurrection, not only teaching them, but also strengthening their faith so as to prepare them for continuing His mission throughout the world: to bring all people for all time into the peace of the Kingdom of Heaven and into right relationship with God.

If we bother at all to read the Scriptures outside of Mass, we often view them as quaint and/or strange stories of events from times long ago. Instead, we should read them with open minds and hearts, recognizing that, whether they are from the Old Testament or the New, they pertain to Jesus Christ fulfilling the will of the Father in order to reconcile a fallen humanity to Himself, our loving and merciful God. That was the point that Christ was making to His two disciples on the road to Emmaus and as He appeared to the others afterwards in the Upper Room.

We might act from time to time in ignorance or confusion, or sometimes even consciously deny our need for Christ and God's mercy. Each day, however, is another opportunity to examine our lives in the light of Christ's teachings and a time to open ourselves to the grace that God freely extends to us, sinners though we are. It doesn't end there, however, for, having experienced the grace of God, we must respond by sharing the mission of Christ for the salvation of the whole world, beginning with the forgiveness that we receive and that which we offer to others.

May God shower you and yours with His love, His pardon, and His peace as we continue to celebrate the great victory of Christ as His faithful disciples, with open minds and open hearts!

#### YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH

#### **CONFESSION**

The two parts of the "Easter Duty" are to go to confession and to receive Holy Communion at least once during the Easter Season. The time period has been expanded to the roughly 100 days between Ash Wednesday and the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity to make it easier for the faithful to fulfill the obligation.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation helps us to comply with the requirement of being in a state of grace to receive Communion. Sadly, while most of the people who come to Mass on Sundays receive Communion very few go to confession.
