From the Pastor's Desk:

~ The Good Shepherd ~

The Fourth Sunday of Easter traditionally is observed as "Good Shepherd Sunday". The Gospel readings for this feast change for each of these Sundays in the three-year cycle. Today we read about Jesus referring to Himself plainly as the Good Shepherd of the sheep, Who lays down His life for His sheep.

We're not too familiar anymore with sheep and shepherds in Middle Village. The last sheep grazing in a neighborhood field probably went to the dinner table many years ago. Nor are we familiar with the ways of sheep, how they follow only the shepherd whom they recognize, or with the ways of shepherds, who will risk personal danger in order to protect, shelter, and nourish their sheep. The latter describes Christ. The former should describe us, who, despite the distractions, allurements, and dangers around us, should keep our eyes and ears fixed on the Good Shepherd, Who knows each of His sheep by name and is known by them.

In the trials and tribulations of ordinary life, no less in those of this current time of continuing pandemic, vaccinations, masks, and social distancing, we should turn to the Good Shepherd for His protection. This goes especially for priests, who are called to image the Good Shepherd, Who laid down His life for His sheep.


There is a petition in the *Liturgy of the Hours* which basically asks the Lord, "Do not let Your people be without their shepherds; do not let Your shepherds be without a flock." That's still something rather difficult for us to achieve in Year Two of the pandemic, what with the restrictions imposed upon us and so many people still being afraid of contact with others. We shepherds often find ourselves under the same restrictions as our people. Still we try to serve as best we can, wherever we can, whether attending to the sick at home or in hospital, or burying the dead and comforting the mourners, or celebrating Mass in church while maintaining "detached contact" with you, the people given into our pastoral care.

Early in his pontificate, Pope Francis said, "The shepherd should smell of the sheep." Pope St. Paul VI put it more delicately years before, saying, "When it rains on the sheep, the shepherd should get wet." Both are making the same point: that priests are bonded to their people by humble, sacrificial love. As we pray for you, so we ask you to pray for us and for those who are called to come after us in service to the Church, that we may carry out the mission that has been entrusted to us as good and faithful shepherds in the manner of the Good Shepherd Himself.

As I noted in my homily on Holy Thursday, the priesthood, the Eucharist, and the Church are tied to one another; no priesthood means no Eucharist, no Eucharist means no full existence as Church as we know it, and the lack of existence of a Church generates no priests. Christ has given us these Sacraments, His way of making sure that the flock is not left without a shepherd acting in His Person whom they can see and hear, thus providing a way in which He may continue to teach and nourish the flock that is first and foremost His.

Unfortunately priests do not drop from the sky or grow on trees. We come from families in which love is nurtured, prayer is important, regular participation at Holy Mass forms an integral part of family life, and the practice of the Faith through humble service is encouraged. If those descriptions do not describe your family, it's well beyond time that they did. Encourage vocations in your own family as well as pray for members of other families who are discerning a vocation or have responded to the call to serve the Church in the priesthood.

Please keep all priests in your prayers, and be assured of my prayers and those of the other priests of the Parish for you and yours. May Christ the Good Shepherd and great High Priest bless, protect, and lead you all to eternal life with the Father!



ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

Over the last few months we've had to repair or replace part of the heating and hot water units for the church-school building and for the rectory. This came to several thousand dollars in unexpected and unbudgeted expenses.
