#### From the Pastor's Desk:

## "On Faith, Faithlessness, and Humility"

As we've done the last two weeks, we continue on the topic of faith in today's readings. Last week, we saw the great effects that the faith of the suffering woman and the dying/dead girl's father had in bringing about not only healing but also a restoration (i.e., a resurrection) of life. Today, we take a look at the other side of the coin: the lack of faith.

Up until now, Jesus had been able to work many miracles that supported both His message and His authority, but miracles require faith, and faith was lacking in Nazareth, and He was not able to do very much among people who should have trusted Him. One can only imagine His frustration and sadness at being rejected by His friends and neighbors. The rejection, whatever its underlying reason, was not enough, though, to dissuade Him from His mission and send Him back to the workbench and obscurity or to make him change His message to something more agreeable. The Father had sent him for a purpose: to call people to repentance for the forgiveness of their sins and to bring about their reconciliation with God. In humble obedience to the Father's will, He would leave Nazareth but not leave the goal unachieved.

Like the Lord, Ezekiel faced rejection from those to whom he was sent to call back to faithfulness and to help to rise out of the despair of their exile. God assured him that, whether the people heeded or heeded not, the Word of God is the unchanging Word of God, and its promises and demands remain unaltered. Faithful to God, Ezekiel humbly carried out his given mission.

St. Paul also knew both successes and frequent frustration over lacks of success as he proclaimed the Gospel in city after city. There is no indication of what the "thorn" in his side was, but it was enough to make him realize that the successes weren't entirely his doing and that he had accomplished them through the power of God. It was only when Paul humbly acknowledged his weaknesses and limitations that he was able to understand the power of God's actions.

You and I are called to be people of faith, entrusting ourselves to God, confident that He knows what He's doing even if we don't. It's not an easy thing to do, but requires work on our part to develop the faith that God has planted in us, placing ourselves humbly in His hands, and persevering in bad times as in good.

Faith requires implementation, which, in turn, requires strengthening ourselves through prayer and reception of the grace of the Sacraments that Christ has given to the Church, studying the Word of God in Scripture, and following the examples of the saints and the good people whom we ourselves have known. In this way we will be better able to respond to the command that we have received: to love, and to put that love into action.

The Prophet Isaiah noted over 2700 years ago that the things of this world are passing, but the Word of the Lord endures forever. That Word can strengthen and transform us, if we allow it to do so by approaching the Lord in humility and faith.

In closing, I'd like to share a thought on the secular observance this weekend of our country's 245th anniversary as an independent nation. It's not my own, but comes from the Declaration of Independence. These words are quite important, as we live in a time in which too many people would tear down and even erase what we have cherished, and so many have fought and died to defend, for generations.

"We hold these Truths to be self-evident: that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness... "And for the Support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the Protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

The challenges to faith, secular as well as religious, are many. With firm reliance on God, let us recommit ourselves to the noble ideals of our nation's Founders, who were not demigods but imperfect people of flesh and blood who dreamed big and entrusted themselves to God. May God bless America!

## **ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL**
