From the Pastor's Desk:

"Feeding the Multitudes — Part I"

This week we take a month's pause from the Gospel according to St. Mark, which is the shortest of the Gospel accounts, in order to focus on St. John's telling of Jesus feeding the multitudes. This miracle is the only one that is reported by all four evangelists, so important is it to the story of Jesus Christ and the Church.

St. John is careful to put the event into a particular place (a wilderness setting) and timeframe: "The Jewish feast of Passover was near." We need to remember that the Passover feast was the annual celebration of the liberation of the Israelites from bondage in Egypt and that God had fed them, through the intercession of Moses, with manna in the wilderness for forty years during the Exodus.

Although there are parallels with Elijah in the first reading and also the Exodus, Christ fed a far greater number of people with much less food and had plenty of leftovers after everyone had eaten their fill. It was Moses who interceded for the people during the Exodus, but God Who provided them with food for the journey. In today's Gospel, Christ both intercedes and takes the initiative in providing for the crowd's needs, as He does for us today.

As astounding as the stories of multiplying food may be to us, the miracle that Christ performs is just the surface of St. John's presentation. The evangelist is setting us up for something much greater, as we will see in the coming weeks. In the meanwhile, look again at the actions that Christ performs: He takes, gives thanks, and distributes. These are the same actions that He would perform at the Last Supper, sealing the New Covenant of redemption with His Body and Blood by instituting the Sacrament of the Eucharist in anticipation of His sacrifice on the Cross.

Furthermore, these are the same actions that the priest does during the Eucharistic Prayers in which he takes the bread, gives thanks, [blesses, breaks,] and gives. St. John is presenting to us a preview of the Eucharist. After almost two thousand years, Christ, through the ministry of His priests, continues to take the initiative of feeding His people with Himself, not once in a blue moon in a particular place, but every day throughout the world at holy Mass.

Unfortunately, unlike the people who were so amazed and wanted to carry Jesus off to make Him their King, we have grown rather nonchalant about the entire affair. We take the Eucharist for granted. Do we even believe that it is the very Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ? Sadly, most people, most Catholics, even among those who come to Mass and receive the Host do not. So many come and behave with all the "reverence" of attending a social or sporting event or a secular meeting. Still, it is NOT just a symbol, but rather the Reality itself, and that requires us to be properly disposed to receive Him, i.e., to be in a state of grace through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We need to be clothed properly in body and in spirit.

Yes, the Eucharist is not a "reward for the holy but is medicine for the wounded", as Pope Francis has pointed out, but it also demands the "triage" of personal confession to cleanse the soul wounded by mortal sin and to prepare it for healing. In addition, it requires a proper disposition, supported by the way that we live as disciples of Christ, along the lines pointed out to us by St. Paul in today's second reading: united in the Spirit with Christ the Lord and, through Them, to God the Father. Our beliefs and our behavior must be compatible, mutually reflective and supportive.

It is our faith that binds us together and which should inform and govern the way that we live, the good things that we say and do, and how we avoid sin and evil. It is the Eucharist that makes and sustains the Church. It is the same Christ Who taught and fed the multitudes on a hillside in Palestine two thousand years ago Who comes to us today in Word and in Sacrament to strengthen us in holiness.

Let us entrust ourselves to Christ more fully, then, through our reverent reception of this great Sacrament, not a mere remembrance of a miracle from the distant past, but rather the gracious and present reality of our compassionate Lord, Who is blessed, broken, and given today in our sight for our salvation and eternal life!
