

From the Pastor's Desk:

"The Law; Chains or Freedom?"

We rejoin the Gospel according to St. Mark today after a few weeks with St. John's narration of the "Bread of Life Discourse". Today's readings focus on internal and external applications of the law, specifically religious law as an integral part of one's way of life.

Laws are necessary for the proper functioning of any society. They establish rights and obligations among its members, not constricting but freeing us for right relationships. Without laws to guide, relationships can become meaningless and chaos ensues. Some laws are abusive, however. One has only to look to the Nuremburg purity laws of Nazi Germany or the Shariah law that is about to be enforced in Afghanistan that bind the human spirit in oppressive chains. These are but two examples.

The law that is presented to us in today's readings is the Divine Law, by which God bound the Israelites to Himself during the Exodus. It was an expression of the Covenant that would establish proper relationships, both among the people themselves and also between them collectively and God. If they followed His Law, His commandments, they would receive His favor and protection and live in harmony and peace, a positive model, moreover, for international relations.

We know from reading the Scriptures that the people's obedience in living out their part of the Covenant wasn't always faithful. Hence, the prophets and, ultimately, the Son of God Himself were sent over time to bring the people back to faithfulness and right living. Along the way, the Law had been clouded and complicated with layer upon layer of lesser laws until it became more a matter of mechanics than loving motivation that governed their execution, of gestures replacing sincerity of heart.

Imagine, though, not the absence of laws but faithful compliance with them, i.e., with the Law of God. What a wonderful world it could be! To live in the freedom of the children of God is to do not whatever we want, be it for wale or woe, but to do what is good, what is right, and what is holy in His eyes. It is a liberating experience insofar as it frees us from the chains of sin and a way of life that demeans the humanity of others and lessens our own as well. It would be a world in which generosity replaces greed and theft, humility replaces arrogance, purity and fidelity replace unchastity, adultery, and licentiousness, and reverence for God replaces blasphemy and sin. All of these come from within a person, but the good conform to the Law "written on our hearts" while the bad contradict it.

What is in our hearts, though, must be expressed by what we say and do, or, as respects the negative, what we refrain from saying or doing. Enter here the admonition of St. James: "Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls. Be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deluding yourselves." Our faith must find expression in the way that we live each day in proper relationship with God and with one another.

We very often reduce the Law to two parts - love of God and love of neighbor - and figure that, just as long as we haven't cursed God or killed any one in the past week, we must be doing okay. Look again at what lies within you.

We have spent the last four weeks studying the Sacrament of the Eucharist, the Bread come down from Heaven, the Real Presence of Jesus Christ that nourishes and sustains us as His disciples and strengthens us to carry out His mission. How can we dare to approach Him in the Blessed Sacrament week after week, if we do not live according to His teachings? To ALL of His teachings? The Scribes and the Pharisees didn't corner the market on hypocrisy.

How do you view the Law: chins or freedom? Let us live, in faithfulness to the teachings of Christ, putting them into effect in our lives, and removing from within us all that separates us from being His good and faithful disciples. May the grace of God be with us all!
