From the Pastor's Desk:

"On Blindness"

Many of us of a certain age read the classic poem "On His Blindness" by John Milton (1608-74). It expresses not only his fears and anxieties as he lost his sight but also the strengthening of his reliance on God.

Fortunately, the closest that most people to get to physical blindness, the growing need for eyeglasses or contact lenses notwithstanding, is when we close our eyes, although we still can "see" images in our mind's "eye" because we have seen these things in reality. But imagine, now, a person who was born blind, who has never seen the beauties of nature or works of art or the people around him/her, who has felt the warmth of the sun but has never marveled at the star-studded majesty of the night sky. Such a one was Bartimaeus in today's Gospel.

We have great concern today for the blind, special living facilities and schools, guide dogs, and the gift of Braille, but, aside from some compassion, these things did not exist in the time of Christ. The blind person would be cut off from the life of the community, including worship, looked upon as a sinner whom God had punished with blindness, moved to the margins of society and the pity of those around him/her, even reduced to begging for some loose change just to get by. Bartimaeus had hit bottom. He also was moved to take good advantage of Jesus' passing by, going out on a limb and crying for attention in the hope that Christ might be able to do something for him. It was worth a shot, anyway.

Just as He did last week with the brothers James and John, Jesus acknowledged the call for attention and asked, "What do you want Me to do for you?" The answer is not a request for power, prestige, or wealth but the heartfelt plea, "Lord, I want to see." "Go your way," Christ responded, "your faith has saved you." That's an odd response, but, even odder, St. Mark tells us that Bartimaeus "immediately ... received his sight and followed [Jesus] on the way."

There's more going on in the story between the lines. Bartimaeus risked his "livelihood" as a beggar, such as it was, for the possibility of a life-changing opportunity of an encounter with Christ. Being able to see would join him to the community's activities and worship but also would deprive him of his accustomed income and require him to change his life, working in order to make a proper living. Christ didn't touch his eyes but told him that his faith had saved him. We easily forget that miracles require faith, actively accepting this gift from God.

Finally, what does it mean that Bartimaeus "followed [Jesus] on the way"? The immediate "way" for Christ was the road to Jerusalem, leading Him to His passion, death and resurrection, as He had been telling His disciples for some time. "The Way" was the term used by the early Church for discipleship, namely, that following Christ entailed the commitment to a whole new way of self-sacrificial living. I suggest that St. Mark is telling us that Bartimaeus wasn't just walking up a dirt road behind Jesus. His faith had brought him to a new realization that he had been given a second chance for life, and he would make the most of it as a disciple of the One Whom he recognized as "Lord".

Sin is an exclusivist turning inward on oneself. It cuts us off from others, blinding us to the love of God and to the people around us. Each one of us suffers from it in our own way in the varied situations of our daily lives. It is overcome by faith, trusting in God's love and mercy in order that we might be healed, the "eyes" of our soul opened, and we put on the proper road of true life in Christ.

As we go our own way in brokenness and need for redemption, Christ asks, "What do you want Me to do for you?" Each of us is called by faith to present our particular blindnesses to Him, and, having been cured, to follow Him along His Way that leads to the fullness of life in the Kingdom of the Father.

May God grant us the grace to ask boldly that He may overcome our blindness!
