

From the Pastor's Desk:

"If You Died Tonight,"

The other day, as I was stopped for a light by the park, I noticed a bumper sticker on the vehicle in front of me. It read, "If you died tonight, would you be in Heaven or in Hell?" The car must have belonged to a Protestant, for, as Catholics, we believe that there is a third "place" to wind up, at least temporarily, namely, Purgatory, which is a state of being in which our souls are purified from the remaining effects of any sins that we commit in the course of our lives and for which we have received sacramental absolution. Thus, we pray for our beloved dead, especially during this month of November, asking God that they may pass quickly from Purgatory into the eternal joys and peace of Heaven.

The pictures that are presented to us in today's first reading and Gospel are not pretty. Rather, they should shake us up, perhaps even terrify us, but in a good way. They are not like scary stories of fictional monsters that we might tell children to keep them from going to a particular place where they might get hurt. Yet, in a sense, they should have relatively the same effect on us, for they both tell us that we must straighten out our lives and live virtuously or suffer terrible consequences.

Perhaps we have become too accustomed by a false sense of security to think that a good and merciful God would never have created Hell no less condemn anyone to spend eternity in it. Certainly, good old Jesus would never do that to us. Why, then, did the Father have to send His Son to call us to repentance and to suffer and die for our sins so that we might be brought to eternal life?

Heaven is not a slam-dunk just because we have been baptized or haven't killed anyone lately. Neither is it anything that we could merit or deserve simply because of our own actions. All that we can do is to respond to God's initiative, which invites us to live, even now, in His love and to share more fully in His divine life by how we act, and what we say, and the personal sacrifices that we offer Him in thanksgiving for all that He has given us, including the very gift of life itself.

Jesus tells us to be prepared to receive Him when He comes "again in glory to judge the living and the dead," as we profess each Sunday in the Creed. Like His first disciples, however, we know neither the day nor the hour of His return. So how are we to be prepared to receive Him?

We prepare by living each day as His good and faithful disciples, accepting the grace of His Spirit in order to live according to His teachings. The good that we do, the suffering that we endure, the sacrifices that we make, the prayers that we offer, the acts of mercy and forgiveness that we extend to others by His grace, all contribute to our daily preparedness in a way of life centered upon Christ.

Let us walk, then, according to His light, calling upon His strength and love as we strive for Heaven and pray for the souls of those in Purgatory. If you died tonight, where would you be? There are three possibilities. Live for Heaven!
