From the Pastor's Desk

"Beware! Be Vigilant!"

This weekend we begin a new liturgical year with the holy season of Advent, a time of preparation for the comings of the Lord. One by one, we will light the candles on the Advent wreath in the sanctuary as we count off the four Sundays. As always, we flip Christ's two comings, focusing liturgically first on His coming in glory to judge the living and the dead at the end of time, and, in the second part of the season, preparing to celebrate His first coming over two thousand years ago.

We're pretty good at the second part (which begins long before the official start of Advent in our secular, materialist culture), but we're not too keen about working on the first part of the season. After all, the second part is joyful. It finds us busy with externals: decorating just about anything that doesn't move (and pets and vehicles, too), running around shopping, attending Christmas parties, baking and cooking, and a whole host of other activities that knock us out before Christmas even arrives so that we're almost all too glad to see it come and go.

The first part of Advent, however, requires a lot more internal work on our part. It's a time of spiritual preparation to receive our Lord Jesus Christ at the end of time – not only of all time, but also of our time, for neither of which do we know the day or the hour. This preparation requires the work of a lifetime, not just of a season of the year.

Once again, the Gospel passage presents us with some fearful images of the overturning and upending of the natural world. Perhaps the signs have taken place so frequently over the centuries that they don't disturb as much as they did the people of past ages. (There was absolute panic in England in 1066, when Halley's comet suddenly appeared; that was the year that the Normans conquered England, ending centuries of Anglo-Saxon rule.) Nevertheless, Christ instructs His disciples to "stand erect and lift your heads," and to recognize that "your redemption is at hand."

He goes on to tell them/us in the second half of the passage that they/we are to beware not to get complacent or lax in our way of following Him but always to be on the alert, lest we be caught off guard by the ravages of sin. That's good advice, but does that mean that we should spend the rest of our lives quarantined in our homes, Bible and Rosary beads in hand, waiting for Jesus to show up? That would be an irrational waste of the life that we've been given by God.

Rather, our state of preparedness depends upon our faithfulness in carrying out Christ's commandments, living a moral life, trusting in God's love for us, calling upon His mercy and readily extending it to others, and offering our lives to God through humble service to those around us. Our prayerful familiarization with the Word of God along with our proper and dignified celebration and reception of the Sacraments that Christ has given to the Church all support and help us to deepen our relationship with God.

If we do that, we cannot help but be prepared to receive the Lord when He comes, whether at the end of all time or at the end of our time. Perhaps we also would be able to recognize that He already is here among us in His Word and, mostly uniquely, in the Sacrament of His Body and Blood in which He is really, truly, substantially present to us. Then, in the words of the Psalmist, "we shall not fear, though the earth be shaken and the mountains fall into the depths of the sea, though its waters rage and foam and the mountains totter at its surging."

Perhaps we might sleep a bit more easily and celebrate the Lord's coming a bit more eagerly, were we to take His words to heart: "Beware! Be vigilant!" That's what Advent's all about, Charlie Brown.
