From the Pastor's Desk:

"Blessed Are You"

We have come nearly to the end of our Advent journey. Today's readings speak to us of the coming of the long-awaited Messiah, the answer to the ancient promises and prophecies. The events described take place not in any splendid palace in the midst of a great city but in otherwise insignificant towns that barely would be accounted as specks on the map. The main characters in the drama are not drawn from the elites of their time but from the "anawim", the poor and lowly ones who frequent the stories throughout the Gospel according to St. Luke, rough and humble folk living simple, ordinary lives. That might seem strange to us who are overly concerned with social standing, power, popularity, and notoriety today.

How strange our celebration would seem, though, to those very same characters of two thousand years ago, with our focus on the glitzy decorations, expensive gifts, and lavish meals shown to us repeatedly on TV. Yes, we have reason to celebrate, but what are we celebrating if not the birth of the great and glorious One, the very Son of God, Who humbled Himself to become like us in all things but sin?

How have we spent these last weeks of Advent preparation? Chances are that we're cramming in our last-minute shopping and food preparations in between premature Christmas parties. Just as a change is warranted during the season of Lent, however, if we are no better off spiritually on Christmas Day than the way that we were on November 27, we've missed the point of Advent and misused the precious time that we've been given for drawing closer to the Lord and preparing a way for Him into our lives, our hearts, our souls.

Understandably, this will be a hectic week for all of us, whether preparing our homes or preparing the church for the holy days. Let's set aside a little time, though, to prepare ourselves spiritually, beginning with going to confession. The last opportunities will take place this Monday from 7:30 to 9:00 in the morning, 3:00 to 5:00 in the afternoon, and finally from 7:00 to 8:00 in the evening. Other parishes throughout NYC will have other times in the course of the day, so as to present a range of timeslots for your convenience. Take good advantage of them.

For spiritual reading, pick up the Bible and read the first two chapters of the Gospels according to St. Matthew and St. Luke that tell us of the conception and birth of the Christ. Or, use the readings guide that is presented each week in the Mass Bells to help you prepare for the daily and Sunday Masses.

In prayer, pray and meditate on the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary. As you set up your Nativity scene, place yourself in the position of the various characters represented by the statues; imagine what it might have been like and pray over what you experience.

As you conclude your gift-wrapping and food preparations, remember the needs of those who are less fortunate. While it's too late to contribute to the food, clothing, and toy drives that we did earlier this month, there's always a monetary donation to the St. Vincent de Paul Society or the charities of your choice to share the blessings that you've been given. (Please don't forget your Parish!)

Finally, come to Mass for each of the feast days as well as on every Sunday to have a personal, living encounter with the Lord Jesus Christ, Who comes to us in Word and in Sacrament. That's the purpose of Christianity.

St. John the Baptist leaped in the womb of his mother, St. Elizabeth, at the approach of the Christ, Who rested in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We also can leap spiritually with joy at the arrival of the same Christ Who comes to dwell in each one of us and enables us to share in His glory because of our humble welcome and state of preparedness.

Blessed are you who believe that what has been spoken to you will be fulfilled!
