

From the Pastor's Desk:

"Commitment Is a Dirty Word"

A couple of weeks ago, Bishop Brennan ordained three men to the priesthood for the Diocese of Brooklyn; last weekend, Bishop Barres ordained three others for Rockville Centre, our "daughter diocese" with which we share Long Island. Six new priests sounds pretty good – that is, until we consider that more than several times that number will retire or die this year and that there are about three hundred parishes with a total of over three million nominal Catholics on LI alone.

In one of the hallways at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception in Huntington, where many of us studied, there hang the photographs of each year's priestly ordination class going back to the 1930s, what we priests reverently (or not so reverently, at times) refer to as "the Days of the Giants". Most of the early classes had over three-dozen men ordained from a much smaller population base, while most of the later classes, including my own, have had only a handful or less. So, what has happened? I wish that there were a simple explanation, but there isn't. Nevertheless, I would offer a thought or two on the matter.

The Catholic population of our area, at least nominally speaking, is several times what it was ninety years ago, and the proportional number of young men in the general population hasn't changed very much. Surely, God hasn't stopped calling men to serve His Church in the priesthood, for we are a sacramental Church, and all but two Sacraments require a priest (or bishop) in order to be celebrated validly for the spiritual wellbeing of the People of God. The need for the Sacraments and, hence, for the priesthood remains strong.

Still, the number of Church (and even civil) weddings is down, as are baptisms; the number of children enrolled in Catholic schools is down, as is the number in religious education ("CCD") programs; Mass attendance is down dramatically. Divorce and temporary co-habitation are up. It isn't the pandemic. All of these situations existed well before Covid hit.

Take a look at today's Scripture readings, and I think we'll find a clue as to the root of the problem. In each of them is the idea of <u>commitment</u>, whether it is to following a religious leader (Elijah or Jesus) or to living in accord with the promptings of the Spirit. Elijah is a bit more lenient with Elisha, but note the reaction of Christ to the hesitation of the potential disciples who place conditions on following Him. He demands <u>total</u> commitment from them – and from us.

Commitment seems to be a dirty word these days, and not just for those who are called to serve the Church in the priesthood, consecrated religious life, or marriage. While the Parish was once the center of neighborhood life, people don't seem to want to get involved today. The problem is not local, confined to one parish or neighborhood; it's endemic in secular society as well as in religion. The elderly, with good reason, are tired of "carrying the ball", and there are many other opportunities for the younger members to use their time, or not use it at all, outside the opportunities and needs of the Church.

St. Paul urged his disciples in Galatia to use their God-given freedom in humble, loving service to one another. That hasn't changed. Discipleship costs, and freedom does not mean license to do whatever we please. It requires that we "live in the Spirit", readily placing ourselves at the disposal of God and of those around us. We attune ourselves to knowing the will of God through prayerful discernment, and we act upon it as Catholic Christians through the grace that He provides through the Sacraments.

We've been fairly successful up until recently in sacramentalizing people, but less so in making true disciples who are willing to commit their lives to following Jesus Christ, especially if that means joining Him on the road to Jerusalem to offer ourselves to God at our own Calvary. Each of us must decide how we will follow Christ and use the freedom that He has won for us.

So, pray for your priests and for those who will come after us, but also be an active disciple yourself here in your own parish and family. Don't let commitment be a dirty word.
