From the Pastor's Desk:

"A Matter of Life or Death"

Daily life, for most people, is full of choices and decision-making: what to wear, what and when to eat, how to respond to a particular situation, etc. The range and importance are vast and seemingly endless, from the mundane to the eternal. Today's readings speak of choices that are of the utmost importance insofar as they affect our life here and now as well as for all eternity.

The first reading, taken from the Book of Sirach, reminds us that we are not puppets on a string but that God has given human beings not only the freedom to choose but also the use of His own immense wisdom to choose correctly so that we can do what is good and right and come to the fullness of life; to choose otherwise would be an abuse of that freedom, leading only to licentiousness and ultimate, eternal death.

A scene towards the end of the movie "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" comes to my mind: The main characters have come to the cave of an aged crusader knight who guards the Holy Grail, the chalice used by Christ at the Last Supper. Whoever would drink from it would have eternal life. The problem is that there are dozens of different chalices from which to choose. The bad guy, greedy for power and wealth and blinded by his erroneous imagination about the Grail, chose an ornate, golden chalice, encrusted with precious gems. No sooner had he drunk from it than he aged horribly at a tremendously rapid pace and – POOF! Gone! The aged knight says, in perfect understatement, "He chose poorly". Indiana Jones, on the other hand, chose a clay cup, such as might be used by a poor workman. Yep! "He chose wisely." He used it to bring and pour water to wash and heal his father's otherwise fatal wound.

It's an entertaining movie, but we don't need the likes of Steven Spielberg or Harrison Ford in order for us to make life or death decisions. St. Paul reminds his congregation in Corinth that we have a wisdom that is not "of this age", but one that is divine, "which God predetermined before the ages for our glory". It is the nothing less than the guidance of His Holy Spirit, given us by God to help us to weigh carefully and maturely the situations that call for moral judgment and action. Thus, we are able to go beyond what the wisdom of this age or what the "woke" or common culture or political correctness would have us do, and to choose wisely, instead, doing what is good and true and holy in the eyes of God.

Christ also calls us to go beyond the prescriptions and limitations of the Law of Moses, to understand its underlying reasons, and to act appropriately for the long haul of eternal life. In doing so, He does not do away with the Law, but brings it to perfection and fulfillment so that we might come to the perfection of God Who created us in His own image and likeness with the capacity to reason and, most importantly, to love. Our observance of God's commandments must be a correct exercise of human freedom and rooted in our love for God and neighbor rather than being a mechanical, minimalist response.

Thus, we go beyond "merely" not killing someone to being reconciled with those with whom we are at odds in order that our worship of God might be carried out properly and received by Him. Similarly, anything that smacks of being a false substitution for real love is an assault against our marriage-covenant relationship with God, and is to be avoided at all costs. Finally, we are to be truthful in our dealings with others, for God Himself is the fullness of truth, and we are to be like Him.

If all of this seems to be a rather tall order to carry out, that's because it is. Still, God never commands us to do what we are not able to do by the grace of His Holy Spirit. Alone, we can do nothing, but St. Paul reminds us through his letter to the Philippians, "I can do all things in Christ, Who gives me strength." He might have added to that "wisdom, courage, love", and a dozen other positive attributes.

How we face choices in our lives and how we use the grace and wisdom of God to decide correctly are matters of grave importance, no pun intended. The upcoming season of Lent is a good time to work on it. So, carefully and prayerfully, choose wisely! It's a matter of eternal life or death.

PREPARING FOR LENT

Lent is a holy season of preparation for the great and solemn feast of Easter. We also should begin to prepare ourselves for our Lenten practices of fasting, prayer, and charitable works of mercy rather than waiting until Ash Wednesday (February 22), so as to make the most of our prayers and penances. Think now about your goals and what you will try to do to achieve them.
