#### From the Pastor's Desk:

# "Life Is Changed, Not Ended"

Last month, our parish theatrical troupe, *Maggie's Little Theater*, presented "The Mousetrap", a wonderful whodunit by Agatha Christie. As has been the custom for seventy-plus years of performances, the audience was asked at the end of each show not to reveal the ending to anyone who hadn't seen it yet, lest it be ruined for him/her. We have an entirely different perspective and reaction, however, when it comes to the idea of the resurrection from the dead. After all, the point has been presented virtually non-stop for almost two thousand years. What confused or astounded the people of Biblical times is today a basic, principal matter of faith for us, yet not without its problems.

The promise of new life as presented in today's first reading from the Book of the Prophet Ezekiel was given to a nation that had been conquered and the cream of whose population had been carried off into captivity in a strange land. It was a prophecy of hope, God's promise of the restoration of life to His Chosen People to be attended by certain signs of verification, and a guarantee: "I have promised, and I will do it, says the LORD." The implication was for the people to have faith in the God of their ancestors, Who was with them even in the dark moments of suffering during their national nightmare. The promise had been fulfilled by the time of Christ in terms of a return of the People to the Promised Land, but not yet on a personal level. The dead would have to wait a little longer.

Today's lengthy Gospel passage from St. John presents some disturbing and heartbreaking scenes, from Christ's announcing of the death of His dear friend Lazarus to His conversation with the two sisters to His reaction to the lack of faith of the mourners to His weeping at His friend's tomb as, perhaps, He contemplated His own imminent confrontation with death.

Here, too, a promise of life was made to Martha: "I AM the Resurrection and the Life. Whoever lives and believes in Me, even if he die, yet shall he live. And everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die." Then trust and faith are called for as He challenged her: "Do you believe this?" Christ asks this same question, my brothers and sisters, of each and every one of us, especially in those moments of personal difficulties and tribulations, of loss and sufferings, when whatever faith we have relied upon is tried and perhaps shattered beyond obvious repair. Through these troubling moments, Christ stands as close to us as He did to Martha and her sister Mary.

Christ continued with great sadness and anguish of heart, along with no little anger over the lack of faith of the crowd. Then, entrusting Himself to the Father, He commanded Lazarus to come forth from the tomb. The man, dead for four days, corrupting and bound head to toe in customary Jewish burial fashion, walked out of the unsealed tomb, at which point Jesus ordered him to be set free, released, and restored.

Something else is going on, though, as we've seen is customary with the Gospel according to St. John. We all too often are dead in our sins, perhaps even written off by ourselves as being beyond reconciliation. The stench of our sins surrounds us. Yet, Jesus mourns and weeps for us, His dear friends, and He stands forth and calls us into newness of life. The wrappings of sin that bind us are removed through mercy of God in the Sacraments of Baptism and Reconciliation by the grace and power of His Holy Spirit, Who unites Him with the Father. Thus, we are set free to answer with the manner of our lives the question that Christ posed to Martha, allowing the Spirit of Christ to dwell within us and to direct us into the ways of holiness and righteousness in the eyes of God.

Our following of the Lord Jesus demands that we die to our old life of sin and self-centeredness and to put on the "new person" in Christ. The practices of this holy season of Lent assist us to accomplish this by the grace of the Father, Who never abandons us and keeps His promises. Persevering in our prayers, and acts of self-denials and charity, we emerge from the tomb that has held us captive and allow the ancient promises to be fulfilled in each of us: "Lord, for Your faithful people life is changed, not ended."

# ANTICIPATING PALM SUNDAY

"Hosanna" is the cry, as the man comes this way, seated upon a donkey, coming slowly, gentle sway. And they greet this man with palms in hand, perhaps thinking that he will restore their land. Palms of victory, declaring the advent of the king, palms of victory, in such rejoicing they do sing. But only he knows that he will be crowned indeed; only he knows what crown will be decreed. The ancient prophecy he is now making true: sadness in this time of joy, so well he knew.
