From the Pastor's Desk:

"Rendering to 'Caesar' and to God"

Have you ever been questioned in such a way that, no matter what answer you give, it will place you in hot water? That's the situation in which Jesus finds Himself in today's Gospel, or so His shrewd adversaries thought. If He answered one way, He could be arrested as a rebel against Roman occupation; if He answered the other, He would lose the allegiance of His oppressed Jewish followers. Lose or lose; your choice, Jesus. As it is, He's too sharp for them, and it's not because He tells them that He's not going to give them an answer that they don't deserve or might use against Him.

"Show Me the coin for the tax," He asks, and they give Him a coin with the portrait of the Emperor Tiberius and inscribed "Divi Augustus Optimus Maximus": "the Divine Augustus, the best and greatest [God]". "Whose image is this?" He asks. "Caesar's," they respond. And then we hear Him say the now familiar phrase, "Then render unto Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God."

In case you haven't noticed it lately, all people of faith are in a similar situation today, being told to choose between the State and its secular values on one hand and God and their religious beliefs on the other. Holding to our faith publicly can disqualify us for advancement in work, schooling, benefits, or public life. (Many "Catholic" politicians prove to be such in name only.) People who grew up under any of the communist dictatorships can attest to the experience first-hand. Who ever would have thought that we'd see it in our own country and be deprived even to speak the truth in public today?

What do we owe to "Caesar", i.e., to the State? For openers, we owe our allegiance as good citizens, using our ethical and moral insights and our talents to support the common good; to obey just laws; to defend our nation in times of war or social unrest; to participate in the political process; to pay fair taxes for services that the State provides; and to exercise our God-given freedoms with concern for others.

What do we owe to God? "You shall love the LORD, your God, with all your soul, and with all your heart, and with all your strength." That's the prayer that faithful Jews have prayed daily for the last 3200 years; we Christians also use it in Night Prayer every Saturday. It's a poetic way of saying that we are to love God with everything that we are and everything that we have. Why? Because we have been created by God in His image and likeness, sharing in the gift of His eternal life. Everything that we are and have comes from God, and we are His. He is the Origin of all life, and thus life itself is sacred and holy and has intrinsic worth and dignity by its very nature.

It is because of this that we Catholics have certain non-negotiable points as we contend in the Public Square, positions that we cannot concede, on which we cannot bend, and on which we cannot compromise. First and foremost among these is the basic right to life of every human being from conception to natural death, which precludes abortion and euthanasia. In addition are the dignity of the human person, composed of a body united to a rational, immortal soul (which precludes selling fetal body parts, embryonic stem cell research, cloning, and sex change surgery or therapies); and the sanctity of marriage as a life-long covenant between one man and one woman, mirroring the fruitful relationship between God and Creation, and between Christ and His Church, and which, therefore, precludes same-sex "marriage" or unions as well as any sexual relations engaged in outside of a valid marriage.

The negatives all have been declared definitively by the Church as being objectively, intrinsically, and absolutely immoral and, as such, cannot be held or supported as acceptable positions by any faithful Catholic. True, there are many other concerns that we should have as disciples of Christ, like addressing the needs of those who are sick, hungry, homeless, poor, abandoned or abused, and safeguarding the environment, being good stewards of the earth's resources, etc. Nevertheless, the pro-life positions stated above must be of the utmost importance in the order of concerns. Without them, the latter list of social responsibilities is impeded, if not entirely impossible to carry out.

Yes, render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, but first and foremost, render unto God what belongs to God: your very life!
