

From the Pastor's Desk:

"Spiritual Sickness and Remedy"

We've grown relatively accustomed over the last few years to hearing seasonal calls for still more inoculations (now up to at least four) as well as quarantining the sick and demanding evidence of certified wellness before we let people participate in everyday activities, and masks seem to be making a come-back. Still, today's Scriptures may strike us as being rather odd.

Despite the recent development and administration of vaccines, the mere thought of possibly contracting any respiratory disease remains a real fear for many people today. For people with little understanding of the nature of diseases and having no common antibiotics with which to fight them as we do today, however, the possibility that anything might start a pandemic must have been absolutely unnerving and even deemed to be a punishment from God.

While both events saw great and painful losses of life, the worldwide influenza pandemic of the early 1900s was far more fatal, relatively speaking, than our recent COVID one. What is presented in today's Scriptures may seem to be but the tip of the iceberg by comparison, yet it was horrifically terrifying, both physically and theologically, to the people of Biblical times.

The ancients believed that what was visible on the outside of a leprous person was actually a sign of what their soul looked like as the result of sin: the more hideous one's outer appearance, the greater the corruption of the soul must be. The effects of sin were tangible, a warning to avoid sin in the fist place. Such persons could not be allowed to corrupt the surrounding population, not only with the physical disease but also, and more especially, by their sinfulness. They had to be kept apart from the rest of society for more important reasons than our practices of social distancing and wearing masks intend. The fear of spiritual infestation and corruption was far greater than the physical.

Today we recognize the causes of many diseases and develop medicines and treatments. Even when something like the recent viruses arise, we try to apply practical means of fighting and containing them. Some diseases, like polio and leprosy, have been dealt with almost to the point of universal eradication. Furthermore, we no longer think of sickness as being a sign of spiritual sinfulness, no less a punishment.

At the same time, we still readily speak of the ugliness of sin. Perhaps we might live differently if we could but see the effects that sin has on our souls. We can't ignore the obvious of body parts decaying and falling off piece by piece, but we do not realize the gradual and more lasting deterioration of our souls whenever we sin. Neither do we recognize the healing of the soul that takes place through the celebration of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, and Eucharist. If we did, perhaps we wouldn't sin so readily or be so indifferent in our approach to the Gifts that Christ has given to His Church.

Frequently in the Gospel according to St. Mark, as in today's passage, we come across what is called the "Messianic secret": Jesus wishes to keep His healing action low-key, lest the people were to come to Him for the wrong reasons. "Salus animarum suprema lex" ("The health/salvation of souls is the supreme Law") is the motto of the Diocese of Brooklyn. It expresses the great mission of Christ and His Church: the spiritual wellbeing of the individual, which goes immeasurably beyond mere physical healing and the providing of social services. Our primary concern must be the state of the human soul for eternity.

The love and mercy that God pours out to us in Christ Jesus, the Physician of Souls, should be no secret to us who have experienced them. We can and should, indeed must, avail ourselves of them on a regular basis through frequent sacramental confession and reception of Holy Communion. Our acts of charity and piety are additional tools that help to heal our souls and keep them healthy.

This Wednesday we will begin the holy season of Lent once again. The ashes that we receive are supposed to be the sign of our desire for renewal and reformation as a disciple of Christ, and of our determination for a conversion of heart. Receive the ashes seriously and piously, not superstitiously. Let us strive to use the time and opportunities for spiritual reform well, so that, although we enter Lent spiritually disfigured, we may emerge at Easter healed of our sins and renewed in body, mind, and spirit.

May God bless you as you begin this spiritual journey!
