From the Pastor's Desk:

~ The Cost and Fruit of True Friendship ~

There was a class on non-Catholic religions in my Fourth Year of seminary formation. We referred to it rather tongue-in-cheek as "Making Friends for Jesus". Christ speaks clearly to His disciples (including us) in today's Gospel passage about true friendship, but it may not be what we'd hope for or expect.

First we hear Him use the conditional "if", which implies consequences for not complying. Then He issues a commandment to the very ones whom He's just called His friends, and not just once but twice. It's rather odd for a friend not only to place conditions on the friendship but then also to command the other to do something to keep it intact. Ask, okay. Request, sure. But command?

The Gospel scene is part of Jesus' final speech at the Last Supper, His "farewell address". He's making it clear to His twelve disciples that, while He has chosen them to be His friends, that friendship requires a definite response on their part. He has come out of loving obedience to the will of the Father with Whom He is united in the bond of love, the Holy Spirit. If the disciples are to remain united with Him, they must respond with the same bond, both to Him and to one another. The love that unites the Father and the Son is to be the same "glue" that binds His disciples.

This required love is not romantic, emotional, or theoretical. Christ again makes it perfectly clear what He commands: He demands that His disciples be willing to give themselves fully for the good of others. Yes, they have been chosen, but it is not for membership in some prestigious social club or exclusive prayer group. They have been chosen to share in His mission, to bear permanent results, achievable only if they follow His example of self-emptying love, just as He fully loves the Father and the Father fully loves Him. True love is demanding.

That's pretty scary, yes? Of course, yes! But Christ never pulls any punches with His disciples. He has shared with them everything that He has been given by the Father. Neither does He pull any punches with us. He has initiated; we are called to respond. You and I have been chosen by Christ to be His disciples, His friends. We, too, have His promise, and we know what He expects of us, if we are to remain in His friendship. We share now in His life by virtue of Baptism, which imposes on us a responsibility, a duty, an imperative, a command: we are to love, i.e., to die to self and to live for Him.

For the most part, we don't engage in a dramatic laying down of our lives like countless martyrs have done for love of Christ, or as soldiers do for love of country and kin. Instead, we respond through the small, daily sacrifices of our lives, putting ourselves on hold for the sake of addressing the needs of another. Perhaps it is to take care of a sick relative or friend. It might be spending more of our personal quality time patiently with a child who requires more attention and guidance. It could be responding to the inconvenient, untimely need of a neighbor who has requested our help, or of a friend who has asked us to do him/her a favor. It might be helping to bring the parish back to life by getting active in one or another ministry when we'd just as soon stay comfortably at home. The opportunities are endless.

St. John gives a major reason for Christian love in our second reading: "love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God." By "knows God", St. John means, "experiences an intimate relationship with Him". Not to love puts us outside that relationship. We'd be out in the cold, empty, eternal darkness, worse than being lost in space without oxygen or a spacesuit.

Christ has called us to share the warm light of His love. God the Father has given us the example of what He expects of us by sending His Son to atone for our sins. Think about it: we have sinned against God, defied Him, turned our backs on Him, rejected His love, and, despite all this, He still has loved us so much as to give us everything in His Son, Who has loved the Father and has complied willingly and humbly with the Father's redeeming will in bringing us back to Him.

Christ has come on a mission that bears the fruit that will last: our eternal salvation. He has chosen us to share in that mission by loving one another, and the Father has given us the Holy Spirit to accomplish all that He asks of us. The love of the Father is extended to us through Christ freely and fully, but it is contingent, conditional upon our response. We are created in the image and likeness of God with the capacity to love, and Christ commands that we put that into effect, producing the fruits of goodness, justice, and truth.

The challenge of Christ's command is before us, as fresh and demanding as it was when He issued it to His disciples at the Last Supper. Let us live and truly love in the light of our Savior, open to the power of His Holy Spirit working in us and through us, that we may enjoy the fullness of eternal life!

THE ASCENSION OF OUR LORD

is the event, where Jesus arose into Heaven at the end of his time on earth.

Jesus' time on earth began with His birth. It was interrupted for three days by His death on the Cross. During that time He descended into the realm of the dead and preached the Gospel to the people who died before Him. This allowed those souls, who accepted Christ as their Savior, to proceed to Heaven. On the third day after His death and burial, Jesus Christ was raised from the dead, an event we call the Resurrection. He spent the next 40 days preaching and preparing His disciples to perform the work of preaching and baptizing all people.

At the end of this 40 day period, Jesus ascended into Heaven.
